## Classroom Supplies – 8 Surefire Ways to Save

### 1. Use social media, become a teacher blogger!

Many of you already have a webpage from your school; why not use it to raise money for your classroom? Turn your webpage into a multimedia platform by using such tools as Twitter, Pinterest, and Facebook. These tools allow you to reach out to parents and community members and vice versa. Parents can tweet or pin a deal they saw and alert you before it expires.

### 2. Sponsor a community event.

Encourage parents to bring in cell phones and other electronics and turn them into a profit. You can also arrange with your colleagues and administrators to set up an outdoor space to receive glass, plastic, and aluminum recyclables to turn into cash at the donation center.
